

OF MIGRANT WORKERS HIT BY VIRUS

I unds from the One Heart,
One Soul Campaign are
playing an unexpected role
in dealing with the tragic outbreak
of the COVID-19 virus among
Ontario's migrant farm workers.

As of early June, more than 240 migrant workers across Ontario had tested positive for the virus, and two had died. More than two-thirds of the cases were near where the Diocese of Hamilton's migrant worker ministry is active through parishes such as Blessed Sacrament in Burford. The ministry focuses on the spiritual care of the workers, who come from other countries and play a vital role in the region's agricultural industry. The outreach includes Spanish-language Masses and receptions, and other events.

The ongoing *One Heart, One*Soul Campaign is aiming to raise
\$500,000 for the ministry, and
Fr. Peter Ciallella, pastor of Blessed
Sacrament and its mission church,
St. Anthony Daniel in Scotland,
spearheaded an effort that will
provide each of the quarantined
workers a gift bag and a greeting
card for Father's Day once they
are released. That effort has been
supported by a number of other
Catholic parishes in the region, as
well as non-Catholic churches and
other organizations.

The diocese has determined that as much as \$100,000 of the campaign's migrant worker ministry funds, some of it already in hand, will be used to help deal with the immediate crisis. An additional \$20,000 per year for five years will be available for immediate needs. The remaining \$300,000 would be used as it is raised for projects such as improving transportation options for the workers and providing additional help with special events and projects.

"When we started the campaign, we couldn't have envisioned this crisis," said Francis Doyle, director of stewardship and development for the Diocese of Hamilton, "but now that it is upon us, we feel fortunate that through the generosity of our parishioners, we are able to provide timely support to these workers. They leave their families for long periods of time to provide for them, and to provide food for us in Canada, and our aim is to minister to them as best we can while they are here."
